







## Operating Income

- The 2021-2022 Season grants were above average due to the many Covid rescue programs that we qualified for.
- Individual donations were a huge part of our ability to complete our return season.
- Box office revenue was decreased due to a slow return of audiences.
- The smallest revenue slice represents corporate sponsorships.

## Ongoing Need

While we are thrilled to be back in action, we know that not all of our audiences are joining us. Nationally, theatre audiences are returning to live events at a much slower rate than hoped following the pandemic shutdown. We saw a 43% drop in attendance last season from prepandemic attendance.

It is estimated that it will be another 3-4 years before we see pre-pandemic numbers at the box office. We have faith that our patrons and donors will continue their support to ensure a bright future for the Williamston Theatre.


